You, along with all our other alumni, are the best witnesses to the blessing the school has been to our parish and our community and I pray that you will continue to be that witness for years to come.

We knew when Mrs. Buehler gave us the tour in May 2021 that SSPP was special, and our son's attendance over the past two years has only confirmed and furthered our initial feeling. Here are a few of the ways SSPP has been so special to us:

The teachers care. That sounds simple enough and perhaps something we should all expect, but in our experience, that is not necessarily the case everywhere. SSPP teachers have been appropriately tough but fair. Not every SSPP teacher goes about it exactly the same, but their styles are complementary to one another. What they do not differ on is wanting the absolute best for students' futures. They take the students' success personally, demonstrating how passionate and caring they are. While they are willing to take a tailored approach according to what is best for an individual student, they do not compromise standards and hold all students to account.

Christ-centered culture. Everyone cares; from the principal, to the office staff, to the youth minister, to the cafeteria manager, to the athletics department. They do things according to what is best for the students and do so in a caring and compassionate manner. Because the teachers and staff put in the effort to care and to be fair, it sets them up to be able to expect the same from the students. But the teachers and staff go first, which sets the standard. They teach the Truth about Christ and what that means to us on this earth and eternally.

The little things. Simple things like the official report card with comments. The opportunity to participate in athletics that may not be available for all levels at a larger public school. The fact that the kids can celebrate Christmas and Easter in their original, intended forms, rather than a couple "happy holiday" songs and some pastels/bunny decorations.

We've loved the school, and feel so thankful and blessed to have found our way here. Even if we just knew it for two years, it will always hold a special place in our hearts. Though four generations of my family have attended Ss. Peter & Paul School, five generations have been members of the church. My family history at Ss. Peter & Paul goes back to the mid-1930s with my great-grandfather and great-grandmother, Vito and Philipina Viviano. When they moved their family to Collinsville, they opened Viviano's Grocery Store across the street from the church, became parishioners, and, subsequently, sent their children to the school. Rosalia Viviano, my grandmother, and her siblings, Tony, Gus, Joe, Nino, Theresa (Wendler), Catherine (Benvenuto), and Angie (Anderson),



attended the school and the church. Generations to come would continue that trend. My mom, Mary (Dee) Viviano, myself, my siblings, Darla and Allen Schuck, and my daughters, Hailey and Imogen, included.

I spent nine formative years inside the walls of Ss. Peter & Paul School, though my 12-year-old self attempted to derail that. Fast forward 25 years, yes, 25 years. In our early 40s, my husband, Rob, and I welcomed our daughter Imogen into our lives. So when we began searching for a preschool, enrolling her at Ss. Peter & Paul only made sense. The same warm feeling greeted us all those years later.

Father John, Mrs. Buehler, who was once Hailey's fifth-grade teacher, Mrs. Sax, Mrs.

Delfina, Mrs. Gaither, Mrs. Jayne, and the rest of the community made our decision easy. Imogen loves school, including library time with Mrs. Laswell, who was my third-grade teacher, and music with Ms. Popovchak-Erickson, who was also Hailey's music teacher. Amid this wealth of generational traditions, we count ourselves lucky.

Ss. Peter & Paul has been enriching our family for five generations. We are so grateful for the lasting commitment to faith-based quality education. In the coming years, I look forward to getting to know Father Mike, Imogen's future teachers, and others who may join us along our path. Here's to generation number six!

Dear Ss. Peter & Paul Alumni,

Greetings! I hope this letter finds you in good health. One of the reasons that you are receiving this letter is so that we can build on the friendship that started with you many years ago when you attended Ss. Peter & Paul School. It's easy to keep in touch with some of you as we still see you at Mass or at functions around town. Some of you are even teachers here! For those of you who have moved away or simply lost touch, you are not forgotten. We would love for you to write to us and let us know how you're doing and your accomplishments.

As I reflect back over this school year and years past, one thing that stands out is that our traditions keep us connected. Some things are very much the same. You may remember your eighth-grade graduation party where you celebrated all the years that you attended school here and the friendships that you made. One of my favorite parts about the celebration is the class video. It's heartwarming to see how much each child changes throughout the years. Many of you still stay in touch with your friends from SSPP. I remember several years ago a former student passed away. The support that her classmates gave to one another was inspiring. They even sat together just like they did when they attended school here. Hearing them reminisce about their time as classmates was truly comforting. I bet you have stories about your time here.

While some things remain the same, other things have changed. We no longer have separate recesses for boys and girls. My first year of teaching at SSPP was in 2000. Not only did the students have separate recesses (on the parking lot), but they also stood in separate lines. We didn't have air conditioning, so the beginning of the school year had shortened days or we taught in places like the cafeteria. I'm happy to report that we have air conditioning and a large, grass

playground. (We are in the process of updating the playground equipment.)

The students still participate in activities like the Young Authors Writing Competition, the 4th Grade Jamboree, and the Catholic Schools Week Class Olympics. We also participate in and host the regional Catholic Schools Speech Meet. This year, we reintroduced clubs that you may remember like Chess Club and Book Club and also started a new Lego Robotics Club. The students are having a lot of fun with all of these activities. Some clubs that our students would like to add next year are baking and drawing.

One activity that we are reminded about frequently is the Ss. Peter & Paul picnic. Everyone seems to have fond stories to tell and many have expressed an interest in having it again. Unfortunately, we don't have the manpower to have a picnic as large as the one that we used to have, but we are going to have a scaled-down version of it. We are excited and hopeful that it will be an event that people will love. The Grill & Chill Block Party is Friday, May 19th and Saturday, May 20th. Old Herald Brewery & Distillery, the Knights of Columbus, and the Ladies Auxiliary are teaming up with us to host it. Old Herald is creating a special beer and spirit just for us! There will be live music, delicious food, games, a bags tournament, and more. We hope that you will be able to join us for the fun!


